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Opener's length in his major:

Usually six cards, because many hands with 7-card suits are worth a jump to three.

Opener's HCP: Because opener doesn't need a great hand to jump in his suit, rebidding his suit at the two level shows a minimum opening bid; usually less than 15 HCP.

East's hand is worth a second bid. He correctly appreciates that: When partner promises a 6-card suit, a singleton honor is adequate support.

West is not strong enough to reverse. Fortunately, there is an easy alternative. I've always believed: Any suit with 4+ honors can be treated as if it has an extra card. Therefore, West bids a sensible 2 \heartsuit .

West's hand is dominated by quacks, but he also has a solid suit and no fewer than seven honor cards. 3NT offers East a choice of games, and because East has nothing to ruff, that is just fine with him. A 1NT response to 1♥ denies having four spades. If responder bids spades later on, it can't possibly be a natural bid. But what does it mean?

After $1 \checkmark - 1$ NT, whether opener rebids $2 \clubsuit$, $2 \diamondsuit$, or $2 \checkmark$, a bid of $2 \bigstar$ (alertable) by responder shows a stronger hand than if he had bid at the three level at his second turn.

Opener is now forced to bid 2NT (also alertable), and responder will then announce which minor he wants to show.



If opener jumps after 1♥ – 1NT, responder can rebid 3♠ (alertable) to say that he does not know what to bid. This flexible bid preserves all options.
